MCEDV Systems Advocacy Activities


MCEDV works to improve system responses to domestic violence by participating in task forces, commissions, and with the legislative body. MCEDV staff provides assistance to our members and community partners on the best ways to support survivors.


In FY23, MCEDV:

Advocates spent over 54,000 hours working with people affected by DV this past year.



There is an increase of almost 7% in the total number of people served since last year and 9% increase since prepandemic 2019.

The number of people seeking help from DVRCs increased again this year. Advocates had fewer total contacts with survivors in 2023, a result of the demand for services that can leave them challenged to offer support beyond focusing on urgent safety concerns and basic needs. Shelter requests hit a three year high, with people typically staying for at least six months as they try to obtain long-term housing. While DVRCs sheltered proportionally fewer people last year, the overall number sheltered was actually slightly higher in 2023 than in recent years.
